## Vancouver and Burnaby

White XANAX bar tested positive for an unknown benzodiazepine and ADB-BUTINACA, a synthetic cannabinoid. Dosing and effects may be significantly different.

ADB-BUTINACA is a synthetic cannabinoid. It is active in very small dosages. Limited data exists about its toxicity in humans. Severe symptoms have been reported from synthetic cannabinoid use: nausea, vomiting, hallucinations, rapid loss of consciousness and seizures. ADB-BUTINACA has been linked to multiple severe poisonings and death. Mixing synthetic cannabinoids with benzodiazepines, puts people at a higher risk of overdose.

Friends, family, and community members using unregulated substances may face increased harms of unknowingly taking different substances than intended.

## Tips for safer drug use:

- Explore with service providers options for witnessing consumption (episodic OPS) and local Overdose Prevention Sites
- Stagger use with friends so someone can respond if needed
- If using alone let someone know and ask them to check on you
  - Download the Lifeguard or BeSafe app
  - Call the National Overdose Response Service (NORS): 1-888-688-6677 if no cell data
- Take a small amount, wait and see how it feels
- Mixing substances increases risk of overdose. This includes alcohol and prescription drugs
